Convair CV-440 flight from South Africa

A pilot's account, by Geoff Sheppard

The flight of the Convair from Wonderboom, South Africa was quite an achievement for an aircraft that has not flown any significant hours for eight years. There had been a lot of work getting it to a standard that allowed the ferry flight to proceed and the results were stunning.

The flight started in early August, with three pilots catching the direct flight from Sydney to Johannesburg. Five days later we departed Wonderboom with a small group of people there to wish us well. It was a bit emotional for those saying goodbye to an aircraft that Rovos Air had owned for 15 years, however that was mixed with the knowledge it was going to a good home.

After departing Wonderboom on 9 August, there were two short sectors, first via Kruger (to get a departure clearance from South Africa) and then to Beira in Mozambique. After that, it was two of the longest flights to the Seychelles then to Mattala in Sri Lanka. Mattala was quite unusual. It is an international airport that appears to have been built in the middle of nowhere, with wonderful facilities and vanishingly little use. This airport and the hotel we stayed at are two of the most vivid and delightful memories we have of the trip.

Next it was across to Johor Bahru on the Southern tip of Malaysia. By now, we were becoming rather tired, since our routine had become an alternation of flying one day and then working on the aircraft the next so a day off to visit Singapore was decided upon.

For the rest of the ferry flight, the aircraft just ran and ran. On the following days we flew to Bali then Darwin, Mt Isa and Dubbo. The final leg, Dubbo to Wollongong, was via an overfly of Parkes to say hello to our satellite facility. Clearing the Blue Mountains and seeing the Pacific Ocean for the first time was quite a sight - and then there was the landing and reception!





To say that we are proud of this aircraft is an understatement. It is a credit to Rovos Air for the care they lavished on the aircraft and our many sponsors who generously (some extremely generously) ensured this aircraft arrived here. We are MOST grateful for their assistance.

September Tarmac Days

September tarmac days saw the following aircraft on display:

- Both Douglas C-47B Dakotas A65-94 and A65-95,
- Douglas DC-3, Hawdon,
- Convair CV-440,
- de Havilland DHC-4 Caribou,
- Lockheed P2V-7 Neptune,
- Lockheed C-121C Super Constellation.

Several aircraft were fired up to test engines and systems, including the Convair CV-440 and Douglas DC-3, Hawdon. Lockheed P2V-7 Neptune, A89-273, which has undergone an extended period of maintenance, was also pushed out onto the tarmac on the Saturday and had all four engines run. The sound of the two, 18 cylinder Wright 3350 engines operating at the same time as the two Westinghouse J34 turbines is quite unique!





Flying Activies

Three HARS aircraft, the Catalina, Neptune and one of the Caribous, will depart mid-October to participate in the RAAF Townsville Air Show and Open Day on 15 and 16 October.

Sunday 30 October sees the arrival of the cruise ship Radiance of the Seas into Port Kembla harbour and a number of HARS aircraft will be in the air to greet the ship and special tours have been arranged for the guests at our facility at Illawarra Regional Airport. Later that morning the Catalina will depart for an overfly of the Rathmines Catalina Festival at Lake Macquarie.

HARS aircraft will overfly Stanwell Park on 9 November despite the Festival of Flight being cancelled this year. The flight is to commemorate Lawrence Hargrave's ascension beneath a string of box kites on Stanwell Park beach in November 1894.



On 24 November the Catalina and Neptune are expected to attend an event at RAAF Edinburgh to commemorate the phasing out of the Orion fleet and replacement with P8 Poseidon aircraft.

As always, the appearance of HARS aircraft is subject to serviceability.

Did You Know...

...the aircraft "Black Box" was originally conceived by Australian engineer David Warren in 1953? He built the first prototype in 1958 but it wasn't until the mid 1960's that the units were redesigned and became widely used.

...the most powerful commercial jet engine in service at this time is the General Electric GE90-115B engine, which is built exclusively for the Boeing 777? In 2002, during certification testing, a GE90-115B set a world record by developing 127,900 pounds of thrust. By way of comparison, the Rolls Royce RB211 fitted to Boeing 747-400 aircraft develops approximately 60,000 pounds of thrust.

...the Convair CV-240 aircraft was initially designed and produced by the American Convair company as a possible competitor/replacement for the Douglas DC-3? The type was produced from 1947 to 1954 in both civilian and military versions, Convair being formed by the merger of the Consolidated and Vultee Aircraft companies.
