RAN Historic Flight finds new home

HARS Aviation Museum is proud to announce that our bid to acquire the RAN Historic Flight collection was successful, the announcement being made on 6 November.

The RAN Historic Flight includes several aircraft that were airworthy until a 2008 decision by the Navy saw the flight grounded. For many years the future of the aircraft remained uncertain until a decision was made to dispose of the Historic Flight collection by a restricted tender process.

The HARS tender for the Historic Flight included a proposal to keep the entire collection together. Our intention, in the short term, is to relocate the collection to our facilities at Illawarra Regional Airport. It is also intended to assess all the aircraft to determine which projects would be practical to restore to airworthy condition.



The Historic Flight comprises two Grumman S-2G Trackers, two Bell UH-IB Iroquois helicopters, two Westland Wessex HAS.31B helicopters, a Douglas C-47 Dakota, Hawker Sea Fury and de Havilland Sea Venom.



Neptune P2V-5 addition to HARS collection

One of the most recent additions to the HARS collection is an ex RAAF Lockheed P2V-5 Neptune, numbered A89-302. The Neptune was previously located at the RAAF Museum at Point Cook, Victoria and has now been relocated to its new home at Parkes, New South Wales. A89-302 is one of only a handful of P2V-5 Neptunes left surviving in the world and the intention is to restore it for static display.

In late October and early November, a team of HARS members went to Point Cook to dismantle the aircraft into components to be trucked to Parkes. The main tasks were to remove the engine barrels, inboard flaps and to break the fuselage into three sections. The wings, tail section and engines had previously been removed. It was clear Lockheed never envisaged the aircraft would one day need to be pulled apart for road transport as evidenced by every bolt stubbornly resisting removal.



Neptune A89-302 was originally built as a P2V-4 but was upgraded to P2V-5 standard whilst still on the Lockheed production line. Delivered to the RAAF in November 1951, its original serial number was A89-595 but was renumbered as A89-302 in August 1952. In June 1959 the aircraft was the first RAAF P2V-5 to be returned to the United States for fitment of its Westinghouse J34 jet engines. The aircraft was withdrawn from service in 1967.

This aeroplane already has a connection with two long term HARS followers. Jim Treadwell was a signaller on A89-302 for its first RAAF mission. He went on to become qualified as a navigator and pilot and was the only RAAF airman to hold all three qualifications. He later commanded 77 Squadron while it was equipped with Mirages and actually flew our Mirage, A3-42.

The other HARS associate was Air Commodore Geoff Michael AO OBE AFC who was pilot / instructor on that first mission. Geoff was a close supporter of HARS and a board member of the Avalon Air Show. He also flew on our airworthy Neptune A89-273. Geoff's son-in-law, David Amor is an active HARS member today.

In a first for HARS Aviation Museum, Oz Flight Sim Expo was held in Hangar One over the weekend of 17 and 18 November. The Expo showcased the latest and greatest in flight simulation technology, with HARS aircraft providing the back-drop for the exhibition.

Moving the event out of its home in Queensland where it had been hosted in various locations throughout the Gold Coast, Brisbane and Sunshine Coast was always going to be a risk for the organisers but it proved to be a very positive experience for the visitors and exhibitors alike. With hardware and software developers from the UK, Germany and the US present the expo gave local simmers a unique opportunity to experience the cutting edge of flight simulation technology.

Australian Aviation Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony

The Australian Aviation Hall of Fame (AAHOF) Induction Ceremony and Dinner was held in Hangar One on Saturday 24 November 2018. This Dinner is held annually to recognise individuals and organisations for their outstanding contributions to Australian aviation and aerospace. At this year's dinner, the following four individuals and one organisation were inducted into the Hall of Fame:

• Ernst Krolke - Developer of the 'slot' system of runway allocation that greatly improved worldwide aviation efficiency;

- The Late Captain David Massy-Greene One of the leaders of the Future Air Navigation System (FANS) enabling more efficient navigation, especially on Trans-Pacific air routes;
- Sir Rod Eddington AO CEO of Cathay Pacific Airways, Ansett Australia and British Airways;
- The Late Dr Rob Lee AO Director of Bureau of Air Safety Investigations, aviation human factors authority;
- Mission Aviation Fellowship Australia (Southern Cross Award) An organisation that provides aviation services for people living in remote areas from Australia and around the world.

The approximately 200 dinner guests were provided with brief video clips highlighting the remarkable achievements of each of the inductees.



Guests were delighted to welcome the Deputy Prime Minister The Hon. Michael McCormack to the dinner. Deputy Prime Minister McCormack, who has ministerial responsibility for the Aviation Portfolio, delivered a thought provoking address on the critical role aviation plays in Australia.

AAHOF has now established its permanent home in the HARS facility at the Illawarra Regional Airport.

Did You Know...

...the Pratt and Whitney R1830 "Twin Row Wasp" radial engine was first built in 1931? Production ceased in 1953 after 173,618 engines were built. The engine has many applications including C-47 / DC-3 Dakota, PBY Catalina, B-24 Liberator and Bristol Beaufort.

...over 18,500 B-24 Liberators were built between 1940 and 1945 making it the most produced heavy bomber ever built?

...the Rolls-Royce Avon engine was the first axial flow jet engine designed and produced by Rolls-Royce with production commencing in 1950 and not finishing until 1974? A derived industrial version is still produced today to power electricity generators for isolated mining operations.

Southern Cross II update

Another major milestone in the Southern Cross restoration was achieved in November with the installation of the first of its three Jacobs R-775 radial engines. The engine and propeller have been beautifully restored and they will soon be followed by two more to complete the major structural elements of the restoration.
